Entertainment District Study

Brief History

Throughout the Summer of 2023, there were increasing concerns over the safety and crime occurring in the W7th entertainment area.

- RFP was completed and two Consultants were selected for interviews
- Created a Steering Committee
- Four Entertainment areas were identified for the study
 - West 7th
 - Downtown
 - Near Southside-Magnolia
 - Stockyards
- Interviews and tours were held on December 6th and 7th, 2023
- Safe Night LLC was selected for this project

Additionally, SteerFW selected 20 entertainment district patrons to be a part of a focus group


These young patrons provided valuable insight into their perception of each entertainment district



Entertainment District Study

Safe Night LLC

- Four-phase approach to the study
 - Completed an on-site assessment for each entertainment district and made recommendations
 - Completed a Risk Terrain Modeling (RTM) Analysis and Assessment
 - RTM identifies environmental conditions that contribute to crime problems
 - Develop a Bar and Restaurant Voluntary Accreditation Model
 - Develop training recommendations for city staff and bar employees





West 7th Strengths

- Established Patrol Team and off-duty officers
- Monthly meetings with West 7th Bar and Restaurant Owners Association meeting
- Well-lit and clean
- Consistent communication between business owners and city agencies






West 7th Recommendations

- Add/Relocate rideshare loading zones
- Increase traffic enforcement and engagement
- Install more high-intensity lighting
- Increase police engagement with patrons exiting the district
- Coordinate with TCU to manage students who commit crimes



Stockyards Strengths

- Off-duty officers present
- Consistent communication between business owners and city agencies
- Active PID





Stockyards Recommendations

- Coordination among FWPD off-duty officers and nightlife team
- City and property owners conduct a lighting evaluation
- City, businesses, PID, sidewalk evaluation
- Increase traffic enforcement and engagement
- Relocate rideshare loading zones

Voluntary Accreditation Model For All Bars and Restaurants

Immediate Benefits

- Expansion and standardization of safety protocols to protect staff and customers
- Develop relationships with Fort Worth municipal staff
- Shifting the perception and status of establishments by collaborating with Fort Worth municipal staff, community stakeholders, and other business owners
- Earn designation as a business that prioritizes safety
- Improving employee well-being and morale





Voluntary Accreditation Model For All Bars and Restaurants

Long-Term Potential Benefits

- •Increase revenue
- Reduce liability for staff and establishment overall
- Possible decrease in insurance rates
- Increase feelings of pride in business and community
- Participate in the cultural and economic vibrancy of Fort Worth





Next Steps

- Complete a Council Resolution to memorialize the intent and support of the program
- The City of Fort Worth's Communications Team has a marketing strategy to garner interest
- Partner with Visit Fort Worth to showcase the accredited locations to our visitors
- Continue to recruit and onboard other bars and restaurants in all entertainment districts
- Monitor the progress and see if any adjustments need to occur
- Evaluate the impact and expand the program
